Impact	<p>Progress and attainment</p> <p>The school achieved strong results in national tests for 17/18 and 18/19. KS2 attainment was particularly high in 17/18 and progress is consistently good in all subjects. Results at KS1 are improving and 100% of children have passed the Y1 phonics screening test in recent years.</p> <p>Internal data shows children making are making good steady progress. Where children need additional support, interventions are put into place quickly and demonstrate a positive impact.</p>	<p>Pupil wellbeing and Inclusion</p> <p>Pupils feel safe and happy in school. They are <i>"unanimous in saying they feel very safe and well cared for"</i>** and are encouraged to be kind, respectful and to think of others. As a result, behaviour is good; when parents have concerns, staff listen to them and address them quickly*. Pupil numbers have increased significantly in recent years, with little outward mobility.</p> <p>The school has a track record of supporting SEND children, including extended transitions and working with secondaries – <i>"the school works tirelessly in ensuring that vulnerable pupils and families are fully supported and included"</i>***.</p> <p>Children's physical health is important – we have recently installed a mile track and have been awarded the School Games Gold Award in recent years to recognise our commitment to competitive sport.</p>	<p>Knowledge and skills</p> <p>Our broad and balanced curriculum has been planned to be sequential and build knowledge and skills. Review lessons and quizzes help to revisit learning and help to place topics in a wider context.</p> <p>As a result, children demonstrate a growing understanding of the importance of the subjects and topics covered. They are becoming increasingly confident in explaining their ideas, using acquired vocabulary from across the curriculum***.</p>	<p>Personal Development and Behaviour</p> <p>Children at Temple Sowerby are well behaved* with <i>"a high level of focus, motivation and behaviour"</i>***. They have a range of responsibilities whilst in school (including Sports Leaders, School Council members, computer and garden monitors) to help them become more responsible, independent and take pride in our school.</p> <p>Children are encouraged to make a positive difference in the world around them and there are many examples of children's independent charitable activities. In 2018 and 2019, the school won the Cumbria Libraries Reading Challenge, demonstrating children's growing engagement with reading.</p>
